First Male' Scout Group

Pioneers of scouting in Maldives since 1956



Scouting in Maldives was launched in Majeediyya School as First Male' Scout Group on 30th May 1956. The group was launched

with the Cub Scout Section and later in the same year the Scout Section was also introduced. In 1963 Majeediyya School's Scout Group was registered in the Imperial Headquarters of The Scout Association in London as the First Male' Scout Group.

During the past 66 years, Scouting in Majeediyya has flourished and the group has successfully imparted the values of Scouting onto countless generations. First Male' Scout Group currently hold the record of having the most number of President Scouts and Baden Powell Awardees. As such, First Male' Scout Group continues to be the most prestigious Scout Group in the Maldives.

Majeediyya Scouts, as the Pioneers of Scouting in Maldives, have played an instrumental role in the formation of the Scout Association of Maldives and continues to serve the Association in various roles.

Silver Tuna Award

The Silver Tuna, with a green, white & red vertically patterned ribbon is awarded to the Adult leaders with eminent achievements and meritorious service to the Scout Association for a period of at least for 20 years. Longest served Chief Commissioner, late Hon. Ahmed Shathir was awarded the "Silver Tuna" - The Highest Scouter Rank in Maldives in 1995



Abdulla Rasheed

Abdulla Rasheed joined the scout movement as a scout of Maieediyya school's First Male' Scout Group in 1960. He then led the formation of the Scout Association of Maldives in 1984 and served as the Deputy Chief Commissioner of the newly formed Association and later as the Chief Commissioner, Abdulla Rasheed's services to establish the Scout Association include the development of the newly formed association's PORs, the commencement of national scout iamborees, the introduction of training programmes for scout leaders and the introduction of the Service Scout Section, Abdulla

Rasheed also played an important role in obtaining membership of the World Organization of the Scout Movement for the Maldives. He previously served as the Regional Director at the World Scout Bureau's Asia Pacific Regional Scout Office from 2002 to 2013 and as the Advisor to the Secretary General of the World Organization of the Scout Movement from 2014 to 2018. In 2013, World Organization of the Scout Movement awarded Abdulla Rasheed the Bronze Wolf Group in recognition of his service to the scout movement.



Ahmed Imad Mohamed

Ahmed Imad Mohamed joined the scout movement in 1960 when he was studying at Sri Lanka's Wesley College. After Sri Lanka Mr. Imad joined Scouting at Egypt's Al Azhar University and completed his leader training in the university's scout group. After returning from Egypt, he was appointed as the first Maldivian Scout Master of Majeediyya School. He also played an instrumental role in establishing the Scout Association of Maldives with Mr. Abdulla Rasheed, Mr. Imad also served in the Asia Pacific Regional Sub-Committee on Training in 1993. Mr. Imad

was awarded the Asia Pacific Regional Chairman's Award in 2000 in recognition of his outstanding services to the scout movement. Mr Ahmed Imad Mohamed also received the Bronze Coconut Award from the Scout Association of Maldives for his contributions to Scouting in Maldives. His most notable contribution include the Scouting resource library named Imad's Scout Library. Through this library he continues to provide resources to Scout Groups throughout the country.



Ismail Shafeeg

Mr Ismail Shafeeq joined scouting in 1963, when he was studying at Majeedhiyya School. In order to serve the scout movement Mr. Ismail Shafeeq joined the Scout Association of Maldives in 1988. Mr.ismail shafeeq served as the International Commissioner. Ismail Shafeeq's work with the then Deputy Chief Commissioner in obtaining membership of the World Scout Association is

noteworthy. Ismail Shafeeq's services can be further highlighted by his invaluable work as vice president and president of the Scout Association. Mr Ismail Shafeeq was presented with the Award for Good Service by the Asia Pacific Regional Scout Office.



Ahmed Ali Manik

Mr Ahmed Ali Manik joined scouting as a scout at Majeedhiyya School in 1965. After the establishment of the Scout Association, he began serving as the treasurer of the association in 1988. Looking at the services of Mr. Ahmed Ali Manik, his services as the Chief Commissioner of the Scout Association should be mentioned. The Scout Association of Maldives had won various national awards and international awards during his nine years on two separate occasions. Under the rule of Mr.

Ahmed Ali Manik, the Scout Association received the National Award of Recognition for Public Service and received the Green Leaf Award for environmental services. Furthermore, it should be noted that the Maldivian Scout Association in the world scout arena was taken to new heights. Mr. Ahmed Ali Manik received the Chairman's Award from the Asia Pacific Regional Scout Office in recognition of his service to the scout movement.



President Scout Award

President's Scout is the highest rank in for the Scout Section and is awarded to young people who has thoroughly trained themselves in Scouting skills and used them in daily life and sets high standards of discipline and academic performance and most of all practices their duty to Allah and the Country.

Mohamed Shauf Rilwan

Shauf joined the scouting movement as a cub scout in 2009 at kalaafaanu school. He completed his president scout award in Majeediyya as scout with 30 proficiency badges. He was also selected as the best all round scout in Majeediyya in 2018. He completed advance scout standard and achieved the bushman's thong in 2020. Mohamed shauf Rilwan is currently doing his graduate studies in bachelors of International tourism management in the Maldives National University

Mohamed Ulwan Muaz

Mohamed Ulwan Muaz started his scouting movement in 2009 from G.DH.Thinadhoo, Thinadhoo school as a cub scout and continued scouting later in majeediyya school. He completed a total of 30 proficiency badges. He completed the advance scout standard and the bushman's thong in 2020. Ulwan is currently doing his graduate studies in Bachelor of arts in political science and international relations in the Maldives National University.



How did you get interested in scouting?

I enrolled to Majeedhiyya school and back then it was compulsory for students to be involved in an extra curriculum activity. That is how I got the opportunity to be involved in scouting. As time went by, I got to know what this movement was about and got interested in scouting.

What was your most memorable experience in scouting career?

The most memorable experience was the first ever camp that I went to which was held at Hulhule'. It is one of the most important memories of my life. When I am reminded of those activities, it is something that motivates me, and those memories will never be forgotten.

Do you think scouting had a role in your personal development?

I believe I am the man I am today because of scouting. With that note, scouts must adhere to certain values. Whatever I do today, I am reminded of the promise that I have made and the scout law. This is also the case in religious

matters. So, it is by abiding by those good values that I am the man I am today. It is something I cherish, and it is because I am a scout, that I came this far.

How did you balance school and scouting or job and scouting?

When I was first introduced to scouting and even now, I support volunteerism and am very interested in it. Scouting is the biggest volunteering organization in the world. I always think about the great service that we are doing for the community.

Even while I was working at the Maldives Airports Company as a managing director, I used to give my time to scouting and the scout association. I used to do even the most menials of jobs. When we talk about balancing time between scouting and work, I do manage my time since it is the only way which will not cause problems in both aspects.

What is your opinion on current status of scouting in Maldives and whats your expectation?

The scouting scene is very different from what it was when I was a scout. The community has changed in many ways when it comes to social aspects and the way we think has shifted drastically. What we are facing is not faced just by us, but the society as whole. As such, today, scouts have forgotten the values that are attached with the promise and law we took. We must rejuvenate those values and my expectation is just that. That scouts bring back those structured values and promote them once again.

What are the notable achievements of scouting in Maldives in the past 66 years?

We maybe a small island state with a small population and less resources compared to other

counties in the region. Scouting in the Maldives is also school based scouting and thus we are unable to retain all these students. However, since the establishment of the Association, we have had considerable and outstanding achievements in the regional and global scouting arena. Moreover, even with all these challenges, we have continued to provide our exceptional service to our region and represented our country well.

What roles do you have in Scouting now?

I do not have any portfolio under the association currently but with my passion for scouting, I am currently working closely with the Maldives Scouts and Guides Fellowship (MSGF) as their secretary general which I am also a founding member of.



Abdulla Rasheed

Former Chief Commissioner Regional Director, World Scout Bureau Asia-Pacific Regional Office

How did you get interested in scouting?

In those school days, we have to choose one cocurricular activity, either cadet, band or scouting. Personally I do not see any charm in "marching" which used to be the main activity of the cadets those days. I have no clue in music and therefore I choose what is left, that is scouting. After I left school and after my studies abroad, I was still interested and very keen to see scouting growing in the country but the absence of a national scout association in Maldives prompted me to work along with few other colleagues to register and establish The Maldives Boys Scout Association (MBSA) in 1984 which was the name then and continued to be associated with it actively till 1997.

What was your most memorable experience in scouting career?

The most memorable experience is not just one, but a few including the camping days in Farukolhufushi, in Hulhule etc, first overseas scout camp trip, being the Chairman of the APR Youth Programme subcommittee as early as 1995, being in-charge of scouting developments in the Asia Pacific Region which had over 75% of WOSM membership, then my personal involvement in the relocation of WSB Office to Kuala Lumpur and setting up of the new office which materialized almost after 10 years.

What would be your answer if someone asks what's the use of being involved in scouting?

I would, without any hesitation, say that it gives total self-reliance, confidence, develops leadership, and it is an opportunity to live-with note-worthy human values of which most important is the service to others and to the community.



Do you think scouting had a role in your personal development?

Yes, in fostering self-reliance, being confident and in fostering leadership qualities and in taking initiatives, in particular

What did you learn from scouting? Are those applicable in practical life?

Life skills, survival skills and to live with the core values of scouting. Yes, they were very applicable in practical life and whatever my success story in life is, it is largely because of scouting experiences

How did you balance school and scouting or job and scouting?

There was no problem in balancing schoolwork and sc

outing then as there was no other engagements like tuition, computer games etc and at the same time one of the co-curricular activities is mandatory and scout meetings / activities are always during the week end. However, since I started working, which was very demanding then, I find time for scout work by spending time for the association after my office hours and almost every day. Those days for


What is your opinion on current status of scouting in Maldives and whats your expectation?

TTo me, scouting in Maldives today lacks or needs much needed visibility, image building, focused attention on individual advancement of the young people, emphasis on core values of scouting, because "other programmes or projects" are taking prominence over the core youth programme. The last but not the least, great contact / partnering with the other National Scout Organizations within the region. I also think there is a need to have a clear demarcation of responsibilities and accountability between the policy body which is the Scout Council and the implementing body which is the Executive Committee

Your advice for scouts

If you are active in scouting, enjoys and believes in scouting for its fundamentals, vales and skills that it imparts, one would never regret it in life. There is enough evidence from research and from personal quotes of many prominent Intellectuals, Scientists, Diplomats and World leading figures who testify by saying what they are today are largely because of scouting.





We had a very insightful interview with Mr. Ahmed Imad Abdulla as he went on to touch various topics, from his experiences studying abroad, his work life from his time at the election commission and his time spent as escort to Mr. Sirimavo Bandaranaike, former prime minister of Sri Lanka to the history and his thoughts on the current situation of Scouting in Maldives.

Scouting for Mr.Ahmed Imad Abdulla started in Colombo, Sri Lanka while pursuing his studies in the Wesley College Colombo in 1961. After his time in Sri Lanka, Mr.Imad joined Rover Scouting in Egypt while continuing his studies there. He went on to complete PTC Training which is equivalent to Basic Unit Leaders Training Course. After returning to Maldives, he continued with scouting, playing an instrumental role in Maldivian Scouting.

In the national level, Mr. Imad's innumerable services to Maldivian Scouting can be seen in the various positions he has held in the Scout Association of Maldives. Among the various posts he had filled in the Association the most notable of them includes; Commissioner for Seniors, Assistant Chief Commissioner for Training and Program and the National Training Commissioner (NTC). He was also a member of the Policy Organization and Rules Revision Committee. Aside from the various positions held in Scouting. He has also worked as a Scout Leader and Scout Master in various Scout Groups such as First Male' Scout Group (Majeedhiya School, Aliyaa School, Mauhad Dirasathul Islamiyya and 15th Male' Scout Group (Zuvaanunge Marukazu). He had also helped start scouting in many schools throughout the Maldives and provided many scout groups with guidance and leadership.

Among his many services and contributions to scouting in Maldives perhaps his greatest contribution would be his tireless efforts and advocacy as the Chief Delegate from Maldives at the 32nd World Scout Conference in Paris in obtaining the membership of the World Organization of the Scout Movement (WOSM).

With all of these valuable contributions and services to Maldivian Scouting, it is no surprise the Mr.Imad has made a lot of firsts in Maldivian Scouting History. Imad was the first Maldivian Scout Leader to hold the Wood badge on 16th July 1990. He also happens to be the First Maldivian to achieve the Leader Trainer beads (4) beads) as well. He was also the first Maldivian Scouter to hold a post in the Asia Pacific Region. He served as a member of the APR Training Subcommittee and later, worked in the APR Scout Foundation Task force. He is among the few prominent scouters in Maldives who have achieved both national as well as international recognition for the dedicated services he has been rendering to the Scout Movement as a recipient of the Bronze Coconut and The Asia Pacific Region's Chairman Award.

Mr. Imad continues to devote his time, resources, and knowledge in scouting as much as he can. He has been preparing and collecting Scouting resources and materials and has been distributing these resources in CD's for free to scouters and anyone who comes to him to learn scouting.

With regards to management of scout groups and the association, Mr.Imad went on to underline that scout groups and the association itself, needs to work on self-sustainability for a better tomorrow. He highlighted examples from Maldivian Scouting such as the sale of garden plants which were a huge success in the past in fund raising. He went on to talk about how associations around the globe went on to successfully become self-sufficient and how the Scout Association of Maldives can localize such ideas in order to achieve self-sustainability.

Mr. Imad message to young scouters is to actively learn about scouting, through reading and researching and apply this knowledge. A very valuable message indeed.
